

# SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

Spring is upon us which means that we enter that annual season related to State Education Department Testing. Of course, this topic can raise the level of concern for everyone in the school community. But let's take a few moments to reflect on this and see if we can make some sense. Let's go back in time a bit...

Do you know when standardized testing started? Go on take a guess, you might be surprised. History tells us that the Father of Modern Education, Horace Mann, began discussing standardized testing back in 1845. Wow! Here are some more historical facts:

- The college Board began looking for a standardized test in 1900 to determine those students that might be more successful in college.
- We didn't have the first standardized test until Alfred Binet created the first intelligence test in 1905
- But the test that really started the movement was Fredrick Kelly's Kansas Silent Reading test in 1914.
- Scholastic Aptitude Tests (the SAT) were based on Fredrick Kelly's test and were first administered in 1926
- In 1933 the SAT was followed by the Progressive Achievement Test which eventually became the California Achievement Tests
- The first automatic test scanning machine was invented in 1936.
- The American College Test or ACT was developed in 1959 to compete with the SAT

But real change didn't come until 1964 with the Great Society Program which began the first Federal Government reach into education. This Great Society Program created the Elementary and Secondary Education Act and initiated the war on poverty through the Federal Title programs. The era of other reforms continued with the *Regent's Action Plan* (1981), the *Compact for Learning* (1990), *Goals 2000* (1994) and finally *No Child Left Behind*. Each reform looked to strengthen standards and assessments and finally culminated with increased accountability.

What is most interesting is that standardized testing administration continues. We took CAT Tests, Iowa Tests, and in the 1990's we would shut down schools for a week at a time to administer Terranova Testing. But until NCLB came along, there was less accountability. The tests were used diagnostically to look at a year's worth of growth and progress with individuals and groups of students. The tests informed instruction by setting benchmarks. We certainly have gotten far afield from that. Up until the 2016 SED Assessments, the tests had become a measuring stick for teacher, principal and school performance as well as a lightning rod for many educators and parents.

We need to share some additional information at this point. Perhaps the first thing to note is that NYS Commissioner of Education, Mary Ellen Elia, has decoupled the NYS Assessments from Teacher Evaluations. And we are back to looking at the tests as an opportunity to see benchmarked growth for our students. The tests themselves have changed. They are untimed. They measure important real-world skills such as problem-solving, critical thinking and writing. The 2016 tests require students to explain their answers and describe as well as defend their reasoning. This is good! And you know what else? The tests are based on the skills in the standards giving parents and educators an academic "checkup" to make certain our students are on track for the skills that come next in the curriculum. The State Education Department has also worked with teachers in the field from across the state (including Pine Valley) to create questions and mandated fewer of them. This year our teachers will be able to see more of the questions after the testing which were never available during the NCLB years. This will help teachers design teaching and learning experiences to match and meet expectations.

The State Education Department has made substantial efforts to minimize concerns over these annual assessments.
